THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT

FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

- 1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- 2. Horses and Athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- 3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.

5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.

VII. ENTRIES

All Athletes & Horses participating in any International competition must be registered with the FEI.

1. QUALIFICATIONS

Each NF must certify the qualification of each horse and athlete and list the competitions which enabled horse and athlete to qualify, according to the qualification procedure established for each star level.

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATION (MER) Acc to Art 516-522:

A Minimum Eligibility Requirement is achieved by completing a Competition within minimum parameters of all round performance as follows:

- a) Dressage Test: not more than 75 penalty points
- b) Cross Country Test:
 - A clear round (0 penalties) at obstacles (see Art. 520 for exception)

- Not more than 90 seconds exceeding the optimum time in the Cross Country Test for one, two and three star level Competitions and 120 seconds in the case of four star level Competitions.

c) Jumping Test: not more than 16 penalties at obstacles.

NOTE: All MERs obtained in previous years will be counted according to the rules in place at that time.

The deadline for obtaining a Minimum Eligibility Requirement for CIs and CIOs is:

- a) At least <u>24 days</u> before the Cross Country Test of the Competition for which is needed if the MER has been achieved at a Long Format Competition (CCIs).
- b) At least <u>10 days</u> before the Cross Country Test of the Competition for which is needed if it has been achieved at a Short Format Competition (CICs).

NOTE: As of 2013, MERs for CIs and CIOs do not expire.

For all Championships the valid period for obtaining a Minimum Eligibility Requirement is from the preceding calendar year to the closing date of the nominated entries.

519 Athletes Categories

FEI Athlete categories for Eventing define a recognition of proven competence of the Athlete at a certain level.

Athletes will be categorised (Uncategorised International, D, C, B, A) according to their performance in a rolling eight years period as defined in the following table.

D	Fifteen (15) MER at FEI short (CICs) or long (CCIs) format Competitions of one star level or above; or five (5) MERs at FEI short (CICs) or long format (CCIs) competitions at higher level
С	Fifteen (15) MER at FEI short (CICs) or long (CCIs) format Competitions of two star level or above; or five (5) MERs at FEI short (CICs) or long format (CCIs) competitions at higher level.
В	Fifteen (15) MER at FEI short (CICs) or long (CCIs) format Competitions of three star level or above; or five (5) MERs at FEI long format (CCIs) competitions at four level.
A	Fifteen (15) MER at FEI short (CICs) or long (CCIs) format Competitions of three star level or above of which five at four star level.

The Athlete category will be updated accordingly to the performances at the end of each calendar year.

NOTE: Exceptionally, an intermediate list of categorisation of Athletes will be published at the latest 1 June 2013.

520 – Minimum Eligibility Requirement for CIs and CIOs

The following table details the requirements needed to be entered in the different formats, categories and levels of international Competitions.

When multiple Minimum Eligibility Requirements are required, one of the Minimum Eligibility Requirements can be achieved incurring 20 penalties at the obstacles of the Cross Country Test.

520.1 Athletes not yet categorised at the level of the Competition

For Athletes not yet categorised at the level of the Competition the Minimum Eligibility Requirements must be achieved as a combination according to the following table:

CCI4*	Uncategorized Athletes or Athletes of	1 CCI3* + 2 CI3*

NOTE: Any Athlete that has obtained a MER in 2012 or before as a combination is automatically qualified to compete at the same type / level of Competition in 2013.

520.2 Athletes already categorised at the level of the Competition

Athletes already categorised at the corresponding level or above, can either use the full requirements for uncategorised Athletes as per Art 520.1 as a combination or the Minimum Eligibility Requirements according to the following table that can apply to the Horse only:

Long format:

CCI4*	A FEI Athletes	NF requirements + 1 CCI3*

NOTE: As a transitory measure the option to use CNs (national Competitions) for qualification purposes can be available until end 2013 for a limited number of targeted CNs by nation of equivalent type and level for a specific reason. Targeted CNs are those for which the FEI has received and approved a request from the relevant NF for this specific purpose.

MERs obtained of the specific targeted national Events will only count for upgrade and not for Athletes categorisation.

The application must be sent a minimum of 4 weeks before the Event. An FEI 3&4 star Technical Delegate must function at the Event taking responsibility for the technical standards/level of the Competition and must report to the FEI (TD report) including full results.

During 2013 the FEI will monitor the policy of approval of targeted CNs for MER purposes for consideration of extension for subsequent years.

522 Reverse Qualification

A reverse qualification is the obligation for a Horse to show restored competence at a lower level (MER) after a number of unsuccessful attempts at a certain level. Reverse qualification only applies to the Horse.

A reverse qualifications is triggered by two consecutive Cross Country eliminations or a total of three Cross Country eliminations within a 12 months rolling period of time in an international Competition. For this purpose the relevant reasons of elimination on Cross Country would be:

- a) Three refusals
- b) Fall of Horse or Athlete
- c) Dangerous riding

In the case of a reverse qualification at certain level the Horse must obtain a Minimum Eligibility Requirement in an international Competition at a lower level before being allowed to compete again at the original level (e.g. Horse with 2 eliminations at 3 star level (any format) must obtain MER at 2 star level (any format) before going back to 3 star level (any format))

If a reverse qualification is triggered by eliminations that occur at different levels (any format), then the Horse must obtain a MER at the level below (any format) the highest level of Competition at which an elimination occurred.

If a reverse qualification is triggered following eliminations at 1 star level (any format) then the NF must assess the Horse and provide a written report to the FEI Eventing Department before the Horse may again take part in any international Eventing Competition.

In addition to the above, should an Athlete be involved with two (2) reverse qualifications within a 12 months rolling period of time (all incidents), his right to use the qualification pathway for categorised Athletes (Art 520.2) will be automatically suspended for one year.

VIII. FACILITIES OFFERED

1. ATHLETES

a) British Athletes and Foreign Athletes Resident in the UK

Accommodation: athletes caravans may be parked free of charge adjacent to the stables. The names and addresses of hire firms will be forwarded on application to any competitor wishing to hire a caravan. The Competition Secretary must be advised at the time of entry if a site is to be reserved for a caravan.

Food: meal vouchers to the value of \pounds 60 will be given to each competitor, which may only be exchanged at the Stables Dining Room.

NO CARAVAN OR BEDDING WILL BE PROVIDED BY THE HORSE TRIALS.

b) Overseas Athletes

Accommodation: athletes are responsible for making their own arrangements. No expenses will be paid. However, an allowance of \pounds 400 will be paid to foreign athletes who are based overseas, if the horse is not normally stabled or competing in Great Britain and has travelled to the event from outside mainland Great Britain since 1st July 2012. (Maximum of 4 per Nation).

Food: meal vouchers to the value of £60 will be given to each competitor, which may only be exchanged at the Stables Dining Room.

<u>TAX</u>: prize money won by overseas athletes may be subject to deduction of UK Tax in accordance with Inland Revenue regulations.

<u>Note</u>

A <u>limited</u> number of electrical connections to horseboxes will be available, if prebooked at a cost of £90.00 (including VAT) for the duration of the event. Athletes must bring their own extension leads and no sharing of a supply is permitted (Connector required – 16amp CForm [male]).

2. GROOMS

a) Grooms of British Athletes and Foreign Athletes Resident in the UK

Grooms caravans may be parked free of charge adjacent to the stables. The names and addresses of hire firms will be forwarded on application to any competitor wishing to hire a caravan. The Competition Secretary must be advised at the time of entry if a site is to be reserved for a caravan.

Food: meal vouchers to the value of £90 for the Stables Dining Room will be provided on the basis of one groom per horse.

b) Grooms of Overseas Athletes

Accommodation: shared caravan type accommodation is provided near the stables on a basis of one groom per athlete.

Food: meal vouchers to the value of £90 will be provided on a basis of one groom per horse.

NO BEDDING WILL BE PROVIDED BY THE HORSE TRIALS.

Medical, Veterinary Assistance etc: the services of a Doctor, Veterinary Surgeon and Farrier will be available but athletes must be responsible for paying any charges incurred.

3. HORSES / PONIES

Stabling, bedding and forage will be provided free for horses for up to 5 days. Transport expenses to be paid by the athlete.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION - ARRANGEMENTS FROM HOTEL TO SHOWGROUNDS IS <u>NOT</u> PROVIDED.

4. WELCOME

The time and date of arrival of athletes and horses and their means of transport must be given to the OC in order to facilitate them on arrival.

IX. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION / INSURANCES/ MEDICAL CARD

1. EVENTING MEDICAL CARD

It is compulsory that Athletes, during the Cross Country Test, carry visibly on their person arm or shoulder a medical card including any relevant medical history of serious illness, injury (particularly to the head), tetanus immunity status, drug allergies, current medication and blood group. Athletes are responsible to record all injuries on the medical card and will not be allowed to start the Cross Country Test without the medical card. Medical cards must be checked by the OC upon arrival to the competition by the athletes and checked by the Official Doctor and the Technical Delegate for accurate information.

2. INSURANCES

"All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out a third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad and to keep the policy up to date".

The FEI insures all FEI Officials, whose names are published in the FEI Officials lists, against third party liability including Judges, Course Designers, Technical Delegates, FEI Stewards, FEI Veterinary Delegates, Para Classifiers, Members of the Judges' Supervisory Panel, Members of the Appeal committee (FEI MCP Veterinarians are covered under a different policy):

- Who are acting for or on behalf of the FEI as stated in the approved schedule of the Event or who are acting in the scope and course of the FEI's Business as described in the final approved schedule; and
- Who have received the status of FEI Officials at FEI Events through a qualification process.

The FEI will NOT insure:

- National officials officiating at FEI Events; and/or
- FEI Officials, who have no official function at the Event.

The insurance extended is for any liability that the FEI Official incurs to a third party, and for the costs of defending any such claim arising as a result of actions undertaken by the FEI Official in good faith (including errors and omissions) on behalf of the FEI. However, the insurance for obvious reasons does not extend to any liabilities incurred as a result of an FEI Official's dishonest, fraudulent, malicious, and/or illegal act.

3. PRIZE GIVING CEREMONY

All completions should present themselves at the prizegiving ceremony.

4. ENTRY RIGHT TO SHOWGROUNDS (Art. 132)

Vehicle Passes and Badges

<u>Athletes' Passes</u>: each athlete will be issued with three vehicle passes, one lorry/parking permit and three security wristlets for access to the stable compound. No trainers passes will be issued and athletes are responsible for passing on one of their vehicle passes to their trainer if they wish. For health and safety reasons, the registration number of all horseboxes and an emergency contact number for the person responsible on the showground, will be required in advance for the preparation of the permit. This permit will be issued on arrival at the Event and <u>MUST</u> be displayed on the windscreen of the horsebox at all times together with the lorry pass.

<u>Owners' Passes</u>: one vehicle pass and two security wristlets will be issued to each owner recorded in the horse's FEI Passport (up to a <u>maximum</u> of 3 owners per horse).

<u>Family/Extra Grooms, etc</u>: application for additional security wristlets for access to the stable compound must be made at time of entry and each application will be decided on its merits (a maximum of two per horse will be issued). Separate passes will be available for family members who require access to the stables area but NOT the stable compound. These passes are for internal use between the show area and stable fields and will not gain entry to the showground from any external gate.

<u>Access to Stables</u>: strict stable security will be in force. Any owner, trainer, veterinarian or other person not in receipt of an official identity wristlet must apply in person to the Event Organisers' office for a temporary admission pass, the issue of which is at the discretion of the Organising Committee. Access to stables will be limited to the persons indicated in Vet. Regs. Art 1005.2.3.

No horse will be permitted to enter the Stables prior to 09.30 hours on Tuesday, 3 September, except with prior arrangement.

All horses entered in the Event must arrive no later than 10.00 hours on Wednesday, 4 September, to permit the First Examination to take place prior to the First Inspection.

Thereafter no horse may leave the competition site before the end of the Event, unless it is eliminated, withdrawn or otherwise retired from the competition.

The horses' passport will be retained until the end of the competition when athletes are responsible for demanding its return.

5. ADVERTISING AND PUBLICITY ON ATHLETES AND HORSES

The Athletes **are** authorised to carry the logo of their personal sponsor in accordance with Art. 541 of the FEI Rules for Eventing. The Chief Steward will check that the advertising and publicity on Athletes and horses complies with these Articles.

6. **PROTESTS (Art. 163-168)**

All protests, to be valid, must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150 or equivalent.

7. EVENT'S ORGANISATION (Art. 109-110)

The OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matters or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. All modifications made to the schedule must have the approval of the FEI Secretary General.

OCs of International Events must inform the FEI and NFs whose teams or individuals have taken part, of the results and prize money paid to each placed Athlete and team, within five (5) days following the Event, unless otherwise specified for qualification and ranking reasons as communicated by the FEI. Any result must be provided to the FEI in a format specified by the FEI in the approved schedule. Failure from OCs of International Events to provide the FEI with the appropriate result(s) and/or prize money information by the aforesaid deadline and/or in the aforesaid format shall entail a warning for the first violation and thereafter a fine of CHF 1,000.-per violation.

8. DISPUTES

In the event of any discussion concerning the interpretation of the schedule (in translated languages), the English version will be decisive.

9. DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY

Save for the death or personal injury caused by the negligence of the Organisers or anyone for whom they are in law responsible, neither the Organisers, Burghley Horse Trials Limited, British Eventing Limited, the Trustees of Burghley Estate, nor any agent, employee or representative of these bodies accepts any liability for any accident, loss, damage, injury or illness to horses, owners, riders, grooms, spectators, land, cars, their contents and accessories or any other person or property whatsoever, whether caused by their negligence, breach of contract or in any other way whatsoever. Further, the Organisers reserve the right to refuse admission to Burghley Park to any person or to withdraw permission at any time to remain in the Park, and shall not be required to give any reason for such action.

The Organisers shall not be liable in respect of any loss or damage whatsoever arising from the abandonment, cancellation or postponement of The Land Rover Burghley Horse Trials, or any such eventuality.

10. PHOTOGRAPHIC RIGHTS

Competitors give the absolute right and permission for any photographic and/or film or video or TV footage taken of persons or horses taking part in the event to be used and published in any media whatsoever for editorial purposes, press information or advertising by or on behalf of the Event and/or the Event's official sponsors.

11. INTERNATIONAL PAIRS CHALLENGE

An additional competition will be held within the CCI4*. After the First Horse Inspection, the top fifteen highest ranked 'British' athletes competing at Burghley, will be paired with the top fifteen 'rest of the world' athletes competing at Burghley as follows, the no 1 ranked British athlete will be paired with the no 15 'rest of the world' athlete, the no 2 ranked British athlete will be paired with the no 14 'rest of the world' athlete etc. Rankings will be taken from the FEI published table as of the 30 August 2013. The pairs' competition scores will be added together and placing calculated as under the FEI Rules for Scoring. Prize money will be awarded to the top three placed pairs as follows:

1st Prize: £2,500(£1250 each); 2nd Prize: £1000 (£500 each); 3rd Prize: £500 (£250 each)

12. RESULTS

In order to proceed with the results publication and for qualification purposes the FEI requires results to be sent in immediately after the conclusion of the event.

X. VETERINARY MATTERS

VETERINARY REGULATIONS (VRs), 13th edition, effective 1 January 2013

Peden Bloodstock must be given the following information at least ten days prior to the arrival of horses of EU origin, and at least four weeks prior to the arrival of horses from outside the EU:

Information on all horses - EC and non-EC

- Name, age, colour, sex and FEI Passport Number
- Name and address of Owner and/or Athlete
- Address where the horse is resident
- Address to which the horse will return after the event
- Port of arrival in Great Britain
- Port of departure from Great Britain
- Registration number of the vehicle that the horse will travel in.

Horses from the EC Member States

All horses from EC nations must be accompanied by the official health certificate for travel within the Community; the certificate must show the FEI Passport Number, and the Passport must accompany the horse at all times. This certificate is not required for horses from Ireland or France.

Horses from outside the European Community

Horses from outside the EC must be accompanied by the health certificate appropriate to their country of origin; details of the correct certificate and of any blood tests which may be needed can be obtained from the official Transport Agents. This certificate will allow the horse to remain in the EC for a maximum of 90 days; should the competitor intend to keep his horse in Britain longer than that, then Peden Bloodstock will provide details of the permanent health certificate including information on the blood tests and pre-export isolation which may apply.

As DEFRA has to be advised well in advance of the arrival of horses from outside the EC, it is important that full details of travel plans are provided to Peden Bloodstock at least four weeks prior to arrival.

Customs Documentation

Horses from outside the EC must arrive with an ATA Carnet issued in the country of origin, to cover the horse and its accompanying equipment. Should any horse travel without an ATA Carnet then either the National Federation or the competitor concerned will be responsible for the costs in connection with temporary import into the EC.

British Export Welfare Regulations

Special Export Licences are required for every horse leaving the country; these are issued by DEFRA and Peden Bloodstock will obtain them providing the essential information is supplied at least ten days before the start of the event. These documents are provided at the competitor's expense. As EC Regulations and Animal Welfare during transport are constantly under review and may be altered at any time, any queries on this subject should be addressed to Peden Bloodstock Ltd who will do their best to provide the relevant information. If any major changes do come into effect after the entry date then Peden Bloodstock will endeavour to contact each competitor or their Federation direct.

Export Health Certificates – where applicable

Peden Bloodstock will arrange for a health certificate to be issued to the veterinary surgeon at the event for each horse to return to its origin, provided the essential information on the return travel plans is given to them a minimum of ten days before the start of the event. The veterinary surgeon will complete this health certificate at the competitors' expense.

PLEASE NOTE that the Organising Committee will not be responsible for any taxes or fines which may be due if any horse or equipment does not return to its country of origin at the end of the event. Should any claim be made against the Organising Committee for any taxes or fines on horses or equipment which have remained in Great Britain or the European Union the National Federation making the entry will be responsible for paying these.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

GENERAL

In accordance with the FEI Code of Conduct it is imperative that all Horses at FEI Events are physically fit and free from infectious disease before being allowed to compete.

ENTRY OF HORSES

NATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

Nil

TRANSPORT OF HORSES

Horses must be fit to travel and be transported in vehicles suitable for the transport of horses. Any government requirements for disease testing and control must be requested well in advance, and the Horse be in compliance by the time of arrival at the border of the country where the Event is taking place. Athletes, or their representatives, have a responsibility to be in compliance of national legislation in both the country of origin, return, and the host nation of the Event; where necessary Athletes must contact local government authorities or veterinary advisors for information regarding animal health requirements and transport legislation. Within the European Union (EU), this includes EU Council Regulation (EC) No 1/2005 concerning the protection of animals during transport within the Member States of the EU.

VENUE ARRIVAL INFORMATION & FITNESS TO COMPETE

PASSPORTS

General Regulations Article 137

For all Horses FEI Passports/FEI Recognition Cards issues, please address to your National Federation

All Horses competing at FEI Events must be registered with the FEI.

FEI Passports or FEI Recognition Cards - for those Horses with a national passport approved by the FEI, are compulsory for FEI Events, with the exception of CNs and CIMs as outlined below.

Athletes whose Horse's Passport and/or Recognition Card is not correctly validated, or failing to meet other requirements for vaccination and Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication control (Veterinary Regulations Article 1030) will be **subject to Sanctions in accordance with Annex II of the Veterinary Regulations**.

Athletes will be required to write their name and counter sign next to any passport irregularity entry noted, as an acknowledgement, prior to receiving the passport and leaving the show ground. Following a warning being issued for such an irregularity the Athlete will have 30 days to correct this, failure to correct such irregularities within 30 days will result in a sanction being imposed.

Note for Horses permanently resident in a Member State of the European Union, all Horses must have a national EU passport in compliance with EU Regulations, to which a FEI Recognition card is applied. The exception to this being Horses in possession of an FEI passport which has been continually revalidated without interruption.

VACCINATIONS - EQUINE INFLUENZA 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1028

Horses competing at FEI Events must comply with the requirements for Equine Influenza vaccination in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations and as summarised below.

Exceptions to the requirement for FEI equine influenza vaccinations currently exist only for those Horses competing at CNs or CIMs where there are no national requirements for influenza vaccination in both the Event host country and the Horse's country of origin (General Regulations Article 137).

EXAMINATION ON ARRIVAL

On arrival at an Event venue all Horses must undergo an examination by a veterinarian to confirm their identification from their passport, their vaccination status and general health. To protect all horses attending events, any Horse with a questionable health status, with regards to vaccination, disease or other concerns, must be stabled within the isolation facilities provided by the Organising Committee pending a decision on entering the venue.

HORSE INSPECTIONS

All Horses will be assessed for their orthopaedic fitness to compete during the Horse Inspection. Any Horse demonstrating questionable fitness may be referred to the Holding Box for further veterinary examination. Horses not deemed fit to compete will be eliminated by the Ground Jury and not be permitted to continue in the competition.

1. EQUINE ANTI-DOPING AND CONTROLLED MEDICATION

Within FEI Groups I & II, the Organising Committee should charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 towards the cost of the EADCMP, which is affected by the FEI Veterinary Department.

SAMPLING

All horses competing at FEI Events may be subject to sampling for the presence of FEI Equine Prohibited Substances in accordance with the FEI Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Regulations (EADCMRs). Horses may be selected for sampling in accordance with obligatory testing, targeted or random sampling procedures (2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1058).

CLEAN SPORT INFORMATION

The current FEI Equine Prohibited Substances List of Banned Substances and Controlled Medications is available on the FEI Clean Sport website: <u>www.FEICleanSport.org</u> as a PDF document, database or smart phone app. Detection times are also provided for a limited number of Controlled Medication substances where available.

Elective Testing may be carried out, by Competitors for their Horses, prior to an Event to check for the presence of prohibited substances (please refer to <u>www.FEI.org/veterinary</u> for information and details).

GROUPS I & II ONLY - FEI CENTRAL LABORATORY

Under Veterinary Regulations Chapter VI, Article 1057 within some geographical regions, as determined by the FEI Bureau, the Equine Anti-Doping Controlled Medication Programme (EADCMP) and procedure is administered by the FEI Veterinary Department. Therefore all samples collected in Groups I and II, must be analysed by the FEI Central Laboratory, currently Horseracing Forensic Laboratories (H.F.L) Sport Science, Quotient Bioresearch Limited Newmarket Road Fordham, Cambridgeshire CB7 5WW.

Samples collected outside of FEI Groups 1 and 2 may be analysed at an alternative FEI Approved Laboratory. 7. VETERINARY TREATMENTS, SUPPORTIVE AND OTHER THERAPIES 2013

Veterinary treatment or supportive therapy required during an Event is under the control of the FEI Veterinary Official (Veterinary Delegate) and only permitted when:

- a) authorised using the appropriate Veterinary Form (see table below, or VRs article 1047-1051), either prior to the competition or prior to administration once the competition has begun;
- b) conducted within the designated Treatment Boxes and
- c) administered by an FEI Veterinarian (VRs article 1003) or Other Treating Professional (VRs article 1021).

Heated or magnetic blankets, physical therapy, ice and cold water, non-prohibited, authorised substances that are administered orally or by nebulisation, or those treatments exceptionally authorised by the Veterinary Delegate are allowed in the Horse's own stable.

Supervision of all such treatments by FEI Officials may take place directly on a random check basis or by requesting to see a copy of the relevant authorisation. No treatments may take place without coming under such control and authority, except in the case of a clear emergency, when a retrospective authority may be considered if the Horse is to continue.

8. VETERINARIANS AT EVENTS

VETERINARY SERVICES MANAGER (VSM)

All Organising Committees must appoint a FEI Veterinarian as a Veterinary Services Manager to be responsible for assisting the organiser in achieving the Minimum Veterinary Standards and facilities required for an FEI Event. The VSM must ensure sufficient numbers of treating veterinarians are available for the type of Event and the number of Horses attending. The VSM may be the event treating veterinarian themselves.

FEI VETERINARIANS

All veterinarians treating Horses during FEI Events, including Team Veterinarians, Athlete's Private Veterinarians and Treating Veterinarians must be registered with the FEI as FEI Veterinarians – either Permitted Treating or Official Veterinarians. Veterinarians must carry their FEI ID Card with them at all times when in attendance at Events and must present this on the request of FEI Stewards or Officials. Athletes are advised to ensure that any veterinarian they wish to treat their Horse during an Event is registered in the correct way with the FEI. Registering as an FEI Veterinarian does not give any automatic right to having accreditation which is issued by the event Organising Committee.

9. NOTES TO ORGANISING COMMITTEES

FEI Veterinary Delegates must verify that adequate facilities and services are provided by the Organising Committee prior to the start of the Event, and ensure that FEI Stewards are aware of the requirements for the authorisation of Veterinary Forms, other treatments and the FEI Veterinarian ID Card during Events.

Organising Committees must also ensure that there are adequately trained stewards or designated individuals who will liaise with FEI Veterinary Officials to assist with the supervision of treatment areas. The Veterinary Forms 1-4 must be kept by the FEI Veterinary Delegate, referenced and submitted in their report to the FEI within 72 hours.

10. PONIES

For all Pony Events, Ponies must be available for Pony Measurement prior to the Horse Inspection (2013 Veterinary Regulations, Chapter IV).

XI. HUMAN ANTI-DOPING

At a minimum, and pursuant to the ADRHAs, Organisers must provide the following at Events where human anti-doping testing is scheduled to take place at least 2 months prior to the Event:

- **1**. One (1) staff member able to act as point of contact and coordinator for the *Doping Control Officers* (*DCOs*) with the contact name and details of this staff member to be communicated to the *FEI* at least two (2) weeks prior to the starting date of the *Event*.
- **2.** Human anti-doping facilities reasonably separated from public activity, consisting of:
 - one (1) private room exclusively dedicated for use by the *DCOs* with one (1) table, two (2) chairs, pens and paper and one (1) lockable fridge; and
 - a waiting room/area with a suitable number of chairs as well as an appropriate amount of individually sealed, non-caffeinated and non alcoholic beverages, which includes a mix of natural mineral water and soft drinks ; and
 - one (1) private and clean bathroom/toilet, adjacent or as near as possible to the *DCO* room and waiting area.
- **3.** Staff members (or volunteers) of both genders, able to act as *Chaperones*. The number of *Chaperones* available to the *OC* must be communicated to the *FEI* as early as possible following receipt by the *OC* of the *Testing* plan for the *Event*. Please see the qualifications for Chaperones in the ADRHAS.

Twemlows Stud Farm will award a scholarship for two embryos to the highest placed British domiciled mare completing the competition providing it is placed in the top 20.

The British Horse Foundation will present a £1,000 prize to the Breeder of the highest placed British Bred Horse providing it finishes in the first six places.

The Worshipful Company of Farriers will award a rosette and a plaque to the owner of the "best shod horse", and a plaque to the registered farrier responsible for its feet and shoeing. Judging will take place during the First Horse Inspection on Wednesday, 4 September.

 \pounds 400 expenses will be paid to every owner whose horse completes the competition without winning a prize and \pounds 50 will be awarded to the groom in charge of each horse that starts the Cross Country Test.
