THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT

FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

- 1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- 2. Horses and athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- 3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
- 5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.

CHARGES BY THE ORGANISER

Entry fee € 410,-MCP fee CHF 12,50

Health Certificate € 25,- per certificate

The entry fee can be paid at the secretary's office. There is a possibility to pay with your bank pass and credit card. If an athlete pays with a credit card 6% bank costs will be charged over the total amount of the account. There is an ATM at the show ground. It's not possible to pay with a cheque.

IMPORTANT - entry forms must include the following information on horses and athletes:

- name of horse and athlete
- horse date of birth
- breed
- (FEI) Passport number/FEI ID
- name(s) of owner(s)

NO-SHOWS/LATE WITHDRAWALS:

Withdrawals after the date of definite entries or no-shows will be held liable to reimburse the OC for the financial loss incurred by the OC as a result of the late withdrawal or no-show. Competitors will receive an invoice (through their NF) for the entry fee of all entered horse(s) and if made the hotel costs. If a competing athlete brings less horses to the show than entered with the definite entries the entry fee remains payable.

passes

Passes will be given free of charge to the competitors, their partners and grooms (1 per rider). An owner of a horse (who is not a competitor and whose name is mentioned in the FEI passport of the concerned horse), will receive a bracelet (max. 2 owners per horse).

declarations

Declarations for the first competitions day have to be made immediately after the first vet check. Declarations for the other competitions have to be made on the night before at the show office (at least 30 minutes after the prize-giving ceremony of the last jumping competition). The show office prefers to receive the declarations every day as soon as possible. No horse will be permitted to compete in any competition, unless the declaration has been made within the specified time. After the declaration has been made, no substitution will be permitted, unless the



event-veterinarian certifies that the declared horse has become unfit to compete, since the time of declarations.

tax

According to the relevant Dutch tax regulations Outdoor Gelderland must charge 6% or 21% VAT on all fees to be paid by the athletes. The athletes can apply for re-imbursement of all VAT paid by filling out a form to request the refund. All athletes will receive an invoice at the end of the show on which the VAT has been specified. stables

Since stabling is limited, in principle there are no stables available for horses that don't participate at Outdoor Gelderland. However, in case the Organising Committee approves the stabling of an extra horse or tack box, the amount of € 100,- excl. VAT, will be charged for each box for the duration of the whole event.



4. WELCOME

The time and date of arrival of athletes and horses and their means of transport must be given to the OC in order to assist them on arrival. Horses are welcome form Wednesday 15.00 hrs until Sunday the 2nd of June 10.00 hrs. If trough circumstances it's not possible for an athlete to arrive and/or leave at set times please contact the OC to search for a solution. V

5. LOCAL TRANSPORTATION - ARRANGEMENTS FROM HOTEL TO SHOWGROUNDS

IX. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

x. ADVERTISING AND PUBLICITY ON COMPETITORS AND HORSES

The athletes **are** authorised to carry the logo of their personal sponsor on the saddlecloth in accordance with Art. 136.1-2. The Chief Steward will check that the advertising and publicity on athletes and horses complies with Article 136 of the General Regulations.

1. GENERAL CLASSIFICATION AT THE END OF THE EVENT

There will be no general classifications at the end of the competitions.

2. PRIZE GIVING CEREMONY

Following each competition a distribution of prizes will take place. Competitors up to the 5th place have to attend to the prize giving ceremony for all classes with exception of the freestyle tests. For the freestyle tests the best 3 riders have to attend the prize giving ceremony The owner(s) of the winning horse / pony in the freestyle tests is invited to the prize giving ceremony. All athletes have to attend the prize giving ceremony on a horse.

3. INSURANCES

The Organizer, the Organizing Committee and all persons workings for the Organizing Committee shall not be liable for any material or physical damage, accident or illness which may occur to owners, renters, competitors, horses and grooms, under any circumstances, within or out of the competition ground before, during or after the competitions. The Organizer, the Organizing Committee and all persons working for the Organizer shall not be liable for damage to driving vehicles, saddlers, stable attachment and other property (including theft and loss).

The competitor indemnifies the Organizer, the Organizing Committee and all persons working for the Organizer from liability with regards to claims made by third parties, including the owners and renters of the horses, for compensation by the Organizer, the Organizing Committee and all persons working for the Organizer for all material or physical damage, or whatever nature, suffered by these third parties.

The competitor has to fill out a liability form concerning the above mentioned before its first start at the secretary's office.

All owners and athletes are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

The FEI insures all FEI Officials, whose names are published in the FEI Officials lists, against third party liability including Judges, Course Designers, Technical Delegates, FEI Stewards, FEI Veterinary Delegates, Para Classifiers, Members of the Judges' Supervisory Panel and FEI Coaches (FEI MCP Veterinarians are covered under a different policy):



- Who are acting for or on behalf of the FEI as stated in the approved schedule of the Event or who are acting in the scope and course of the FEI's Business as described in the final approved schedule; and
- Who have received the status of FEI Officials at FEI Events through a qualification process. The FEI will NOT insure:
- National officials officiating at FEI Events; and/or
- FEI Officials, who have no official function at the Event.

The insurance extended is for any liability that the FEI Official incurs to a third party, and for the costs of defending any such claim arising as a result of actions undertaken by the FEI Official in good faith (including errors and omissions) on behalf of the FEI. However, the insurance for obvious reasons does not extend to any liabilities incurred as a result of an FEI Official's dishonest, fraudulent, malicious, and/or illegal act.

Should an FEI Official become aware of an incident that he or she believes might result in a claim, that FEI Official should notify the FEI immediately and provide all of the facts known to the FEI Official. The FEI cannot guarantee the insurance coverage described above in circumstances where the FEI Official has good cause to believe that there might be a claim and does not provide such timely notice directly to the FEI.

All horses, entered for the competitions of Outdoor Gelderland must be stabled in the official stables (immediately following the veterinary inspection of the horses for the entire duration of the event).

For identification purpose all horses stabled have to carry their identification number whenever leaving the stables; offences against this rule, first will occur a € 50,00 fine and in case of a repeated offence will lead to permanent exclusion from the stables.

practice area

Training of horses is only allowed at the specified time on the official and controlled exercise area, provided by the Organizing Committee from Wednesday 29th of May (immediately following the horse inspection) until the conclusion of the event on Sunday 2nd of June. FEI stewards will permanently control the exercise areas. During a competition the main practice area is strictly reserved to horses starting in the present competition.



5. START LISTS & RESULT SHEETS

The name of the owner of each horse/pony will be added to all start lists and result sheets, as well as its stud book initials, country of birth, sex and age.

6. PROTESTS/APPEALS

All protests and appeals to be valid must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150.- or equivalent.

7. EVENT'S ORGANISATION

In exceptional circumstances, together with the approval of Chefs d'Equipe and Ground Jury, the OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matter or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. Any such changes must be notified to all competitors and officials as soon as possible and they must be reported to the FEI Secretary General by the Foreign Judge.

8. DISPUTES

In the event of any discussion concerning the interpretation of the schedule (in translated languages), the English version will be decisive.

9. RESULTS

In order to proceed with the results publication and for qualification purposes the FEI requires results to be sent in immediately after the conclusion of the event.

Results including the amount of prize money awarded (if any) and the value of the prizes in kind are to be sent by e-mail to anna.milne@fei.org, in the proper Excel file immediately after the event. All results must include FEI Passport Registration number of horses and the FEI ID numbers of Riders. The name and nationality of the horses owner must also be included with the results. All athletes who have not completed the event must appear on the results sheets.

XI. VETERINARY MATTERS

VETERINARY REGULATIONS (VRs), 13th edition, effective 1 January 2013

1. CUSTOMS FORMALITIES

The competitors have to arrange their own transportation and are moreover responsible for arranging correct custom formalities. Non EC-competitors are strongly advised to travel with an ATA-Carnet; there's no Custom agency in charge.

2. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

Horses from outside the Netherlands need a health certificate. Outdoor Gelderland provides a health certificate for € 25,00 excl. 6% VAT. If a competitor form outside the Netherlands doesn't need a health certificate this must be mentioned on the day of arrival at the show secretary. Outdoor Gelderland will charge the health certificates once the VWA has made them.

GENERAL

In accordance with the FEI Code of Conduct it is imperative that all Horses at FEI Events are physically fit and free from infectious disease before being allowed to compete.

TRANSPORT OF HORSES

Horses must be fit to travel and be transported in vehicles suitable for the transport of horses. Any government requirements for disease testing and control must be requested well in advance, and the Horse be in compliance by the time of arrival at the border of the country where the Event is taking place. Athletes, or their representatives, have a responsibility to be in compliance of national legislation in both the country of origin, return, and the host nation of



the Event; where necessary Athletes must contact local government authorities or veterinary advisors for information regarding animal health requirements and transport legislation. Within the European Union (EU), this includes EU Council Regulation (EC) No 1/2005 concerning the protection of animals during transport within the Member States of the EU.

VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT CONTROLS

These will be carried out in accordance with the "Veterinary Regulations", Art. 1011 & the discipline rules.

"General Regulations", 23rd Edition, effective 1st January 2009, updates effective 1st January 2012 will apply:

3.1.1 Art. 137.1

Every horse entered for any competition at CNs or CIMs (see Appendix E) in a country other than the country of the Horse's nationality and all Horses entered for other CIs, CIOs, FEI Championships, Regional, Olympic Games and Paralympic Games, whether at home or away from the country of its nationality (see GRs 139.2), must have an official, valid FEI passport, or a national passport approved by the FEI and accompanied by an FEI Recognition Card and, when applicable, an FEI registration number, as a means of identification and to establish ownership. In the case of horses permanently resident in a member state of the European Union, all horses must have an acceptable National EU approved passport in compliance with regulation (EC) No 504/2008, to which an FEI recognition is applied. The exception to the latter being the possession of AM FEI passport which has been continually revalidated without any interruption.

3.1.2 Art. 137.2

Horses taking part in CNs and CIMs (see Appendix E) and in CSIP and CSICh-A in their country of nationality are not required to have such a passport as is mentioned in paragraph 1. All such horses must be properly registered with the FEI and identifiable and, unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country and in the country of origin all horses must have a valid vaccination certificate. All horses permanently resident within a member state of the European Union, must have as minimum a suitable national EU approved passport in compliance with regulation (EC) No 504/2008.

Athletes whose Horse's Passport and/or Recognition Card is not correctly validated, or failing to meet other requirements for vaccination and Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication control (Veterinary Regulations Article 1030) will be **subject to Sanctions in accordance with Annex II of the Veterinary Regulations**.



Athletes will be required to write their name and counter sign next to any passport irregularity entry noted, as an acknowledgement, prior to receiving the passport and leaving the show ground. Following a warning being issued for such an irregularity the Athlete will have 30 days to correct this, failure to correct such irregularities within 30 days will result in a sanction being imposed.

Note for Horses permanently resident in a Member State of the European Union, all Horses must have a national EU passport in compliance with EU Regulations, to which a FEI Recognition card is applied. The exception to this being Horses in possession of an FEI passport which has been continually revalidated without interruption.

VACCINATIONS - EQUINE INFLUENZA 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1028

Horses competing at FEI Events must comply with the requirements for Equine Influenza vaccination in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations and as summarised below.

Exceptions to the requirement for FEI equine influenza vaccinations currently exist only for those Horses competing at CNs or CIMs where there are no national requirements for influenza vaccination in both the Event host country and the Horse's country of origin (General Regulations Article 137).

EXAMINATION ON ARRIVAL

2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1032

On arrival at an Event venue all Horses must undergo an examination by a veterinarian to confirm their identification from their passport, their vaccination status and general health. To protect all horses attending events, any Horse with a questionable health status, with regards to vaccination, disease or other concerns, must be stabled within the isolation facilities provided by the Organising Committee pending a decision on entering the venue.

HORSE INSPECTIONS

2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1033

All Horses will be assessed for their orthopaedic fitness to compete during the Horse Inspection. Any Horse demonstrating questionable fitness may be referred to the Holding Box for further



veterinary examination. Horses not deemed fit not to compete will be eliminated by the Ground Jury and not be permitted to continue in the competition.

EQUINE ANTI-DOPING AND CONTROLLED MEDICATION 2013

Veterinary Regulations, Chapter VI

EQUINE ANTI-DOPING AND CONTROLLED MEDICATION PROGRAMME (EADCMP)

Details of FEI Approved Laboratory appointed to carry out analyses on samples collected at this event. (Vet. Regs. Art. 1021). The list of approved Laboratories and further information is available on the FEI website.

Within FEI Groups I & II, the Organising Committee should charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 towards the cost of the EADCMP, which is affected by the FEI Veterinary Department.

SAMPLING

All horses competing at FEI Events may be subject to sampling for the presence of FEI Equine Prohibited Substances in accordance with the FEI Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Regulations (EADCMRs). Horses may be selected for sampling in accordance with obligatory testing, targeted or random sampling procedures (2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1058).

CLEAN SPORT INFORMATION

The current FEI Equine Prohibited Substances List of Banned Substances and Controlled Medications is available on the FEI Clean Sport website: www.FEICleanSport.org as a PDF document, database or smart phone app. Detection times are also provided for a limited number of Controlled Medication substances where available.

Elective Testing may be carried out, by Competitors for their Horses, prior to an Event to check for the presence of prohibited substances (please refer to www.FEI.org/veterinary for information and details).

FEI LABORATORY FOR SAMPLE ANALYSIS

GROUPS I & II ONLY - FEI CENTRAL LABORATORY

Under Veterinary Regulations Chapter VI, Article 1057 within some geographical regions, as determined by the FEI Bureau, the Equine Anti-Doping Controlled Medication Programme (EADCMP) and procedure is administered by the FEI Veterinary Department. Therefore all samples collected in Groups I and II, must be analysed by the FEI Central Laboratory, currently Horseracing Forensic Laboratories (H.F.L) Sport Science, Quotient Bioresearch Limited Newmarket Road Fordham, Cambridgeshire CB7 5WW.

Samples collected outside of FEI Groups 1 and 2 may be analysed at an alternative FEI Approved Laboratory. Addresses and contact details can be found at

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<u>VETERINARY TREATMENTS, SUPPORTIVE AND OTHER THERAPIES 2013</u> Veterinary Regulations Cp. V Veterinary treatment or supportive therapy required during an Event is under the control of the FEI Veterinary Official (Veterinary Delegate) and only permitted when:

- a) authorised using the appropriate Veterinary Form (see table below, or VRs article 1047-1051), either prior to the competition or prior to administration once the competition has begun;
- b) conducted within the designated Treatment Boxes and administered by an FEI Veterinarian (VRs article 1003) or Other Treating Professional (VRs article 1021).

Heated or magnetic blankets, physical therapy, ice and cold water, non-prohibited, authorised substances that are administered orally or by nebulisation, or those treatments exceptionally authorised by the Veterinary Delegate are allowed in the Horse's own stable.

Supervision of all such treatments by FEI Officials may take place directly on a random check basis or by requesting to see a copy of the relevant authorisation. No treatments may take place without coming under such control and authority, except in the case of a clear emergency, when a retrospective authority may be considered if the Horse is to continue.

3. VETERINARIANS AT EVENTS

2013 Veterinary Regulations, Chapter II

VETERINARY SERVICES MANAGER (VSM)

All Organising Committees must appoint a FEI Veterinarian as a Veterinary Services Manager to be responsible for assisting the organiser in achieving the Minimum Veterinary Standards and facilities required for an FEI Event. The VSM must ensure sufficient numbers of treating veterinarians are available for the type of Event and the number of Horses attending. The VSM may be the event treating veterinarian themselves.

FEI VETERINARIANS

All veterinarians treating Horses during FEI Events, including Team Veterinarians, Athlete's Private Veterinarians and Treating Veterinarians must be registered with the FEI as FEI Veterinarians — either Permitted Treating or Official Veterinarians. Veterinarians must carry their FEI ID Card with them at all times when in attendance at Events and must present this on the request of FEI Stewards or Officials. Athletes are advised to ensure that any veterinarian they wish to treat their Horse during an Event is





registered in the correct way with the FEI. Registering as an FEI Veterinarian does not give any automatic right to having accreditation which is issued by the event Organising Committee.

4. NOTES TO ORGANISING COMMITTEES

FEI Veterinary Delegates must verify that adequate facilities and services are provided by the Organising Committee prior to the start of the Event, and ensure that FEI Stewards are aware of the requirements for the authorisation of Veterinary Forms, other treatments and the FEI Veterinarian ID Card during Events.

Organising Committees must also ensure that there are adequately trained stewards or designated individuals who will liaise with FEI Veterinary Officials to assist with the supervision of treatment areas. The Veterinary Forms 1-4 must be kept by the FEI Veterinary Delegate, referenced and submitted in their report to the FEI within 72 hours.

XII. HUMAN ANTI-DOPING

At a minimum, and pursuant to the ADRHAs, Organisers must provide the following at Events where human anti-doping testing is scheduled to take place at least 2 months prior to the Event:

- 1. One (1) staff member able to act as point of contact and coordinator for the *Doping Control Officers* (*DCOs*) with the contact name and details of this staff member to be communicated to the *FEI* at least two (2) weeks prior to the starting date of the *Event*.
- **2.** Human anti-doping facilities reasonably separated from public activity, consisting of:
 - one (1) private room exclusively dedicated for use by the *DCOs* with one (1) table, two (2) chairs, pens and paper and one (1) lockable fridge; and
 - a waiting room/area with a suitable number of chairs as well as an appropriate amount of individually sealed, non-caffeinated and non alcoholic beverages, which includes a mix of natural mineral water and soft drinks; and
 - one (1) private and clean bathroom/toilet, adjacent or as near as possible to the *DCO* room and waiting area.
- **3.** Staff members (or volunteers) of both genders, able to act as *Chaperones*. The number of *Chaperones* available to the *OC* must be communicated to the *FEI* as early as possible following receipt by the *OC* of the *Testing* plan for the *Event*. Please see the qualifications for Chaperones in the ADRHAs.



5. EXTRA

starts

During the competition three competitors have to be mounted and ready to enter the arena. If a competitor does not react upon calling his start number, his turn will pass and the combination will be eliminated from that particular competition. (Unless certain circumstances prevent him from appearing at that time, e.g. losing a shoe, before his turn to start).

horse protection

From the time the competitors enter the showground they are obliged to adhere to the Regulations of the Dutch law for animal protection. In case of infringements the respective Athlete at discretion of the Ground Jury will be suspended from the event and may lose any right or privilege he/she is entitled to.

dogs

Dogs must be on a leash during the whole event. Offences against this rule, first will incur a € 100,00 fine (including VAT) and in case of a repeated offence, will lead to permanent exclusion from the stables.

smoking

Smoking inside the stables is strictly prohibited; offences against this rule, first will incur a € 100,- fine and in case of a repeated offence a € 250,- fine (including VAT) and will lead to permanent exclusion from the stables and the show.

special rules

The Organizing Committee has the right to use photos and videotapes from athletes and horses, made during Outdoor Gelderland, for promotional purposes.

All prizes in kind (inclusive cars) will be delivered in the Netherlands, and considered to be won in the countries of the athletes concerned.

hospitality

The Organizing Committee offers the possibility to rent a VIP-table for the entire duration of the event, at a rate of € 5.000,- per table for 8 persons including drinks, lunch and luxury snacks. information can be obtained via the event secretary. Reservations have to be sent, together with the entries.

final conditions

Simply by enrolling a horse into Outdoor Gelderland the Person Responsible fully accepts the conditions of the schedule and of the programme itself, applicable for the competitors, grooms and the horses. In case of a dispute with regard to the interpretation of this official schedule, the English text takes precedence.

International competitions should not start before 8:00 am and should not finish after 23:00 pm unless approved by the FEI.

IMPORTANT

The total amount of prize money shown for each Competition in the schedule must be distributed. If fewer competitors take part in a Competition than the number of prizes indicated in the schedule, the President of the Ground Jury is responsible for recalculating the prize money to be distributed. The value of the 1st prize must not exceed 1/3 of the total prize money distributed for the competition. Distribution of prize money - min. 5 if less than 20 competitors in the competition, distributed to 25 % of participants. (GR Art 127)

The retail value of all prizes in kind must be mentioned as well as detail of model, type and special features for cars.
