# THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT

## FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

- 1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- 2. Horses and athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- 3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
- 5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.

#### Further information:

- German Athletes have to use the German online system NeOn.
- Closing dates of entries have to be adhered to. Late entries or later changes will only be accepted on approval of the OC.
- The number and kind of required stables, the number of required electric supplies and the required accommodation (kind, arrival and departure date) have to be given with the entries. If the entry does not contain information on number of boxes and/or power supply, the OC reserves one electric supply per Athlete and per horse entered one box. All expenses will be charged to the Athlete's account. Hotel rooms are only booked when ordered in writing.

#### NO-SHOWS/LATE WITHDRAWALS:

In case of withdrawals or no-shows after the date of definite entries the athlete or the respective NF will be held liable to reimburse the OC as a result of the late withdrawal or no-show. The amount to be charged will be the starting fee per horse; in addition possible costs for hotels etc. will be invoiced.

#### 1. ATHLETES

#### 2. GROOMS

In the accreditation office, each groom of the CDI4\* will receive vouchers for each day of the event (break-fast and one meal / 17<sup>th</sup> May, noon to 20<sup>th</sup> May, noon).

Accommodation will be made available upon request at athlete's expense. Sufficient sanitary and showering facilities for male and female grooms, with hot and cold water, will be provided by the OC.

Caravans and live-in lorries can be parked near the stables (as far as space will be sufficient). If possible, the stable manager will provide for electric supply (no self-service!). For the electric supply, a nonrecurring fee of  $\in$  60 incl. VAT has to be paid to the stable manager. Sufficiently long cables have to be brought along.

#### 3. HORSES:

Horses will be stabled from 16<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> May 2013 in mobile boxes; stable fee is included in the entry fee. The required number of boxes must be ordered with the entry. **No boxes can be claimed unless they were ordered in advance.** Only the assigned stables are allowed to be used.

- First Bedding (straw) free. Further bedding (straw/shavings) may be bought on site. The Athlete himself has to take care for fodder. Mangers have to be brought along.

- Boxes may be reserved for max. two horses per athlete
- The OC grants no reimbursement of transport charges.

# 4. LOCAL TRANSPORTATION - ARRANGEMENTS FROM HOTEL TO SHOWGROUNDS

Free transportation arrangements from the official show hotels to show grounds will be available from 17<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> May 2013.

#### 5. WELCOME

The time and date of arrival of Athletes and horses and their means of transport must be given to the OC to facilitate them on arrival.

#### 3. PRIZE GIVING CEREMONY

The Organizing Committee reserves the right to have the prize giving ceremonies at a later time. The 8 best Athletes have to present themselves for the prize-giving ceremony of each competition.



# 4. INSURANCES

All owners and athletes are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

#### FEI insures all FEI Officials

The FEI insures all FEI Officials, whose names are published in the FEI Officials lists, against third party liability including Judges, Course Designers, Technical Delegates, FEI Stewards, FEI Veterinary Delegates, Para Classifiers, Members of the Judges' Supervisory Panel and FEI Coaches (FEI MCP Veterinarians are covered under a different policy):

Who are acting for or on behalf of the FEI as stated in the approved schedule of the Event or who are acting in the scope and course of the FEI's Business as described in the final approved schedule; and

Who have received the status of FEI Officials at FEI Events through a qualification process.

The FEI will NOT insure:

National officials officiating at FEI Events; and/or

FEI Officials, who have no official function at the Event.

The insurance extended is for any liability that the FEI Official incurs to a third party, and for the costs of defending any such claim arising as a result of actions undertaken by the FEI Official in good faith (including errors and omissions) on behalf of the FEI. However, the insurance for obvious reasons does not extend to any liabilities incurred as a result of an FEI Official's dishonest, fraudulent, malicious, and/or illegal act.

Should an FEI Official become aware of an incident that he or she believes might result in a claim, that FEI Official should notify the FEI immediately and provide all of the facts known to the FEI Official. The FEI cannot guarantee the insurance coverage described above in circumstances where the FEI Official has good cause to believe that there might be a claim and does not provide such timely notice directly to the FEI.

#### LIABILITY

The organizer declines any liability for property or pecuniary damage which may happen to visitors, athletes, grooms and horse owners through slight negligence of the organizer, his delegates or his assistants. The OC is liable in case of intent, gross negligence as well as in case of injury to life, body or health and in further cases he is liable for compelling legal liability acc. to the legal requirements. Furthermore he also declines any liability for theft, or other incidents.

#### 5. ENTRY RIGHT TO SHOWGROUNDS / ACCREDITED PERSONS

Entry right to showgrounds will be handed out to Athletes, one partner per Athlete, one groom per Athlete and per horse two owners (max. 2 horses per Athlete acc. to FEI-passport). The names of the above mentioned persons have to be given through the Athlete to the OC before the event has begun. Entry Right to stable area acc. to VR Art. 1005.2.5.

#### 6. PROTESTS

All protests to be valid must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150.- or equivalent.



#### 7. EVENT'S ORGANISATION

In exceptional circumstances, together with the approval of the Delegate of the NF GER and Ground Jury the OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matter or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. Unforeseen circumstances do not include situations arising as a results of the OC altering the approved Schedule without FEI's authorisation. Any such changes must be notified to all athletes and officials as soon as possible and they must be reported to the FEI Secretary General by the Foreign Judge.

#### 8. DI SPUTES

In the **event** of any discussion concerning the interpretation of the schedule (in translated languages), the English version will be decisive.

#### 9. RESULTS/STARTING LISTS

The **name** of the owner of each horse/pony will be added to all start lists and result sheets, as well as its stud book initials, country of birth, sex and age.

In order to proceed with the results publication and for qualification purposes the FEI requires results to be sent in immediately after the conclusion of the event.

Results including the amount of prize money awarded (if any) and the value of the prizes in kind are to be sent by e-mail to <u>anna.milne@fei.org</u>, in the proper Excel file immediately after the event. All results must include FEI Passport Registration number of horses and the FEI ID numbers of Athletes. The name and nationality of the horses owner must also be included with the results. All athletes who have not completed the event must appear on the results sheets.

#### 1. CUSTOMS FORMALITIES

For customs and veterinary formalities for horses from abroad, the OC charges 40,00 EUR per horse.

#### 2. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

#### GENERAL

In accordance with the FEI Code of Conduct it is imperative that all Horses at FEI Events are physically fit and free from infectious disease before being allowed to compete.

#### ENTRY OF HORSES

Every Athlete is obliged to deliver all necessary health certificates for the transport to the event or identification of the horses before they come into the stables:

a) in case of arrival from a EU-member-country, a certificate for registered horses acc. to sample of Annex B to Reglements 90/426 (see annex Vet. I) of the actual valid form will be necessary.



b) in case of arrival from a country not belonging to the EU, a health certificate for registered horses acc. to sample of annex II (see Annex Vet. II) of the decision of the commission 92/260 of the actual valid form will be necessary.

A certificate must be done in at least one official language of the country of destination and in one official language of the member country. The Athlete must carry with him the original certificate, not a copy.

The organiser sees to it that on the competition site, an official state veterinarian is present to issue the health certificates which are necessary for the transport of the horses to their destination abroad.

In case the OC has entrusted a forwarding agency, the latter is ready to assist regarding the required documents.

Furthermore, questions relating to health requirements for horses can be directed to the veterinary authorities in the country of origin or in Germany.

#### 3. NATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

- German Animal Welfare Act (Tierschutzgesetz)
- German Law concerning Manufacture and Distribution of Medicines (Arzneimittelgesetz)
- German Law Governing Epidemic Diseases (Tierseuchengesetz)
- German Regulation for Animal-Welfare during Transport (Tierschutztransportverordnung)
- German Regulation regarding Livestock Transport (Viehverkehrsverordnung)
- etc.

#### 4. TRANSPORT OF HORSES

Horses must be fit to travel and be transported in vehicles suitable for the transport of horses. Any government requirements for disease testing and control must be requested well in advance, and the Horse be in compliance by the time of arrival at the border of the country where the Event is taking place. Athletes, or their representatives, have a responsibility to be in compliance of national legislation in both the country of origin, return, and the host nation of the Event; where necessary Athletes must contact local government authorities or veterinary advisors for information regarding animal health requirements and transport legislation. Within the European Union (EU), this includes EU Council Regulation (EC) No 1/2005 concerning the protection of animals during transport within the Member States of the EU.

#### PASSPORTS

#### General Regulations Article 137

# For all Horses FEI Passports/FEI Recognition Cards issues, please address to your National Federation

All Horses competing at FEI Events must be registered with the FEI.

FEI Passports or FEI Recognition Cards - for those Horses with a national passport approved by the FEI, are compulsory for FEI Events, with the exception of CNs and CIMs as outlined below.

Athletes whose Horse's Passport and/or Recognition Card is not correctly validated, or failing to meet other requirements for vaccination and Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication control (Veterinary Regulations Article 1030) will be **subject to Sanctions in accordance with Annex II of the Veterinary Regulations**.

Athletes will be required to write their name and counter sign next to any passport irregularity entry noted, as an acknowledgement, prior to receiving the passport and leaving the show ground. Following a warning being issued for such an irregularity the Athlete will have 30 days to correct this, failure to correct such irregularities within 30 days will result in a sanction being imposed.

Note for Horses permanently resident in a Member State of the European Union, all Horses must have a national EU passport in compliance with EU Regulations, to which a FEI Recognition card is applied. The exception to this being Horses in possession of an FEI passport which has been continually revalidated without interruption.

#### VACCINATIONS - EQUINE INFLUENZA 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1028

Horses competing at FEI Events must comply with the requirements for Equine Influenza vaccination in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations and as summarised below.

Exceptions to the requirement for FEI equine influenza vaccinations currently exist only for those Horses competing at CNs or CIMs where there are no national requirements for influenza vaccination in both the Event host country and the Horse's country of origin (General Regulations Article 137).

#### EXAMINATION ON ARRIVAL 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1032

On arrival at an Event venue all Horses must undergo an examination by a veterinarian to confirm their identification from their passport, their vaccination status and general health. To protect all horses attending events, any Horse with a questionable health status, with regards to vaccination, disease or other concerns, must be stabled within the isolation facilities provided by the Organising Committee pending a decision on entering the venue.



#### HORSE INSPECTIONS 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1033

All Horses will be assessed for their orthopaedic fitness to compete during the Horse Inspection. Any Horse demonstrating questionable fitness may be referred to the Holding Box for further veterinary examination. Horses not deemed fit not to compete will be eliminated by the Ground Jury and not be permitted to continue in the competition.

#### 6. EQUINE ANTI-DOPING AND CONTROLLED MEDICATION

#### 2013 Veterinary Regulations, Chapter VI EQUINE ANTI-DOPING AND CONTROLLED MEDICATION PROGRAMME (EADCMP)

Within FEI Groups I & II, the Organising Committee should charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 towards the cost of the EADCMP, which is affected by the FEI Veterinary Department.

#### SAMPLING

All horses competing at FEI Events may be subject to sampling for the presence of FEI Equine Prohibited Substances in accordance with the FEI Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Regulations (EADCMRs). Horses may be selected for sampling in accordance with obligatory testing, targeted or random sampling procedures (2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1058).

#### CLEAN SPORT INFORMATION

The current FEI Equine Prohibited Substances List of Banned Substances and Controlled Medications is available on the FEI Clean Sport website: <u>www.FEICleanSport.org</u> as a PDF document, database or smart phone app. Detection times are also provided for a limited number of Controlled Medication substances where available.

Elective Testing may be carried out, by Competitors for their Horses, prior to an Event to check for the presence of prohibited substances (please refer to <u>www.FEI.org/veterinary</u> for information and details).

#### 7. VETERINARY TREATMENTS, SUPPORTIVE AND OTHER THERAPIES 2013 Veterinary Regulations Chapter V

Veterinary treatment or supportive therapy required during an Event is under the control of the FEI Veterinary Official (Veterinary Delegate) and only permitted when:



- a) authorised using the appropriate Veterinary Form (see table below, or VRs article 1047-1051), either prior to the competition or prior to administration once the competition has begun;
- b) conducted within the designated Treatment Boxes and
- c) administered by an FEI Veterinarian (VRs article 1003) or Other Treating Professional (VRs article 1021).

Heated or magnetic blankets, physical therapy, ice and cold water, nonprohibited, authorised substances that are administered orally or by nebulisation, or those treatments exceptionally authorised by the Veterinary Delegate are allowed in the Horse's own stable.

Supervision of all such treatments by FEI Officials may take place directly on a random check basis or by requesting to see a copy of the relevant authorisation. No treatments may take place without coming under such control and authority, except in the case of a clear emergency, when a retrospective authority may be considered if the Horse is to continue.

#### 8. VETERINARIANS AT EVENTS

#### 2013 Veterinary Regulations, Chapter II

#### VETERINARY SERVICES MANAGER (VSM)

All Organising Committees must appoint a FEI Veterinarian as a Veterinary Services Manager to be responsible for assisting the organiser in achieving the Minimum Veterinary Standards and facilities required for an FEI Event. The VSM must ensure sufficient numbers of treating veterinarians are available for the type of Event and the number of Horses attending. The VSM may be the event treating veterinarian themselves.



#### FEI VETERINARIANS

All veterinarians treating Horses during FEI Events, including Team Veterinarians, Athlete's Private Veterinarians and Treating Veterinarians must be registered with the FEI as FEI Veterinarians – either Permitted Treating or Official Veterinarians. Veterinarians must carry their FEI ID Card with them at all times when in attendance at Events and must present this on the request of FEI Stewards or Officials. Athletes are advised to ensure that any veterinarian they wish to treat their Horse during an Event is registered in the correct way with the FEI. Registering as an FEI Veterinarian does not give any automatic right to having accreditation which is issued by the event Organising Committee.

#### 9. NOTES TO ORGANISING COMMITTEES

FEI Veterinary Delegates must verify that adequate facilities and services are provided by the Organising Committee prior to the start of the Event, and ensure that FEI Stewards are aware of the requirements for the authorisation of Veterinary Forms, other treatments and the FEI Veterinarian ID Card during Events.

Organising Committees must also ensure that there are adequately trained stewards or designated individuals who will liaise with FEI Veterinary Officials to assist with the supervision of treatment areas. The Veterinary Forms 1-4 must be kept by the FEI Veterinary Delegate, referenced and submitted in their report to the FEI within 72 hours.

#### 10. PONIES

For all Pony Events, Ponies must be available for Pony Measurement prior to the Horse Inspection (2013 Veterinary Regulations, Chapter IV).

# **III. HUMAN ANTI-DOPING**

At a minimum, and pursuant to the ADRHAs, Organisers must provide the following at Events where human anti-doping testing is scheduled to take place at least 2 months prior to the Event:

- **1**. One (1) staff member able to act as point of contact and coordinator for the *Doping Control Officers* (*DCOs*) with the contact name and details of this staff member to be communicated to the *FEI* at least two (2) weeks prior to the starting date of the *Event*.
- 2. Human anti-doping facilities reasonably separated from public activity, consisting of:
  - one (1) private room exclusively dedicated for use by the *DCOs* with one (1) table, two (2) chairs, pens and paper and one (1) lockable fridge; and
  - a waiting room/area with a suitable number of chairs as well as an appropriate amount of individually sealed, non-caffeinated and non alcoholic beverages, which includes a mix of natural mineral water and soft drinks ; and
  - one (1) private and clean bathroom/toilet, adjacent or as near as possible to the *DCO* room and waiting area.
- **3.** Staff members (or volunteers) of both genders, able to act as *Chaperones*. The number of *Chaperones* available to the OC must be communicated to the FEI as early as possible following receipt by the OC of the Testing plan for the Event. Please see the qualifications for Chaperones in the ADRHAs.

#### DEDUCTIONS FROM PRIZE MONEY AT COMPETITIONS PRIZE MONEY Distribution of Prizes and Indemnities

All prize money and all prizes in kind rewarded instead of prize money as well as reimbursements (e. g. transport charges, travelling expenses) will be distributed acc. to FEI-RG Art. 127/128 following the last competition at the latest. The scheduled prizes are gross amounts.

Settlement will be done per athlete. Depending on the agreement with the horse owner, each athlete binds himself to pass on to the horse owners the prize money or prizes in kind rewarded instead of prize money. The organizer is allowed to deduct possibly outstanding debts of the athlete. Acc. to § 50a EstG this also applies to foreign horse owners. After having deducted the VAT from the prize money or prizes in kind rewarded instead of prize money, as a rule the following income tax will be due: no taxes up to 250 EUR, 15 % exceeding 250 EUR (in force as of 01.01.2009); plus solidarity fee (at present 5.5 %) of the income amount. Travelling expenses being taken over or reimbursed are only regarded as revenues if they exceed the actual costs and the reimbursement for additional meal allowances acc. to § 4 Abs. 5 Satz 1 Nr. 5 EstG. The tax deduction has to be certified on demand. Those foreign athletes being exempted from tax deduction are kindly asked to submit an exemption certificate either with the entry or on the first show day at the latest. Every athlete himself is responsible for the correctness of the details he submits.

If Athletes have to be placed equally, the money value of the prizes in kind (e. g. a car) is divided accordingly.

#### IMPORTANT

The total amount of prize money shown for each Competition in the schedule must be distributed. If fewer athletes take part in a Competition than the number of prizes indicated in the schedule, the President of the Ground Jury is responsible for recalculating the prize money to be distributed. The value of the 1st prize must not exceed 1/3 of the total prize money distributed for the competition. Distribution of prize money - min. 5 if less than 20 athletes in the competition, distributed to 25 % of participants. (GR Art 127)

Athletes acc. to VI. (CDI4\*) - Invitations with horses of 8 years and over. Dress and saddlery acc. to Art. 427 and 428. Judging acc. to Art. 430-434. CDI4\*



#### Qualifying Process

The Athletes must state, at the latest at the date of definite entry for which Competition they wish to qualify, competition 20 (Grand Prix Special) or competition 21 (Grand Prix Freestyle). Athletes may give a 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> choice if the OC so allows (i.e. Athlete will opt for Grand Prix Freestyle as 1<sup>st</sup> choice and Grand Prix Special as 2<sup>nd</sup> choice. Following conclusion of Competition the Freestyle is oversubscribed and the Athlete may then start in the Grand Prix special instead). Participation is, however, only possible in one (1) of the Competitions with the same Horse, and their original choice of Competition cannot be changed if there is space in that Competition.
